

SUPPORTING YOUR WILDCAT







While your student begins a new chapter, do not forget the important role you continue to play in your student's life. Use these suggested topics to navigate timely conversations with your Wildcat. We recommend these discussions take place before your student arrives on campus. You know your student best, so use this guide as you see fit.

COMMUNICATION

Support your student by staying connected via phone, social media and even snail mail. Create an agreement with your student about how often and in what form you both are comfortable communicating. Will you talk once a day? Once a week? Will you communicate over the phone? Via text? Via email? How quickly do you expect a response from each other once contact is being made?

PROBLEM SOLVING

Allow your student the opportunity to share feelings and ideas with you before you take action. Discuss how and when you will be involved with problem solving. Issues like roommate disagreements, time management, academic focus and more may arise. What will your family support look like without you solving problems for your student?

HOMESICKNESS

Feeling homesick is expected. For many students, this may be the first time away from home for an extended period of time. It is very common to miss family, friends and even pets. How do you plan to handle the homesickness phone call? Encourage your student to seek involvement opportunities and to speak with their resident assistant or a counselor in Counseling Services.

GRADES

What earned a student an A in high school may not earn them the same grade in college. Communicate your expectations about academic performance including grades, study time and seeking support early on from professors and the Academic Success Center. Remember that what a student learns in the classroom is more important than the actual letter grade awarded.

SAFETY AND WELLNESS

New students are often living on their own and exposed to college and city life. Have candid conversations about alcohol, drugs, using the buddy system, dating, relationship violence, self-care, sleep and more. Remind your student to self-advocate and utilize support services on campus.

NEWFOUND FREEDOM

Some students are experiencing for the first time what life is like completely on their own. Unlike college, your student's high school schedule was very structured. Students now decide their own timetable: when and what they eat, how much sleep they get each night, the number of hours watching TV and the time spent completing homework. As they adjust to their newfound freedom and develop a routine, be flexible. Provide suggestions and trust your student's navigation of their new autonomy.

FINANCES

Discuss money management, expectations and credit-card use. Does your student need to consider a part-time job to pay for the extras? Does your student expect you to send money when it's needed?

VISITS BACK HOME

We know you love having your student home. Communicate now about when and how often your student will visit. What will the visit back home look like? How will your student get home? Will you establish a curfew? Will your student need to disclose plans while home?

INVOLVEMENT

Remind your student to never stop making connections on campus. Encourage them to attend events, meet friends and join student organizations. Also, remind your student to continue discovering new opportunities around campus and Charlotte.

GRIT

College can be tough. We encourage students and families to get comfortable with the uncomfortable. Understand that students may need to attempt challenges multiple times until they are happy with the results. Help each other embrace challenges often and learn from new situations, setbacks and successes.

FIRST YEAR & NEW STUDENT CHECK IN

It is a day you have anticipated, dreamed about and maybe even dreaded. We realize check-in day is an important time for your student and family. Here are some helpful tips to make this day a memorable one:

- Encourage your student to read through the information sent by Residential Life with your student's room assignment and specified move-in time.
- Please refrain from arriving earlier than your specified time. JWU utilizes special driving and parking plans during move- in. Campus Safety & Security will direct you as you arrive on campus.
- Once your student receives the room key, your student should begin moving belongings immediately.
- Many families bring their own hand trucks, rolling containers or moving materials to make the process easier.
- Dress for the day: plan for the weather and wear comfortable shoes. All family members and guests should expect to do some walking.
- Have questions? Staff will be stationed throughout campus to assist you.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS & PRIVACY ACT



The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that, among other things, protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. When your child was in elementary and high school, FERPA provided both you and your child with rights to access and control your child's educational records. These rights transfer to the student when they reach the age of 18 or attend a school beyond the high school level.

While parents understandably have an interest in a student's academic progress, they are not automatically granted access to a student's education records without written consent from the student. Currently enrolled students can authorize parents or other individuals to have electronic access to certain portions of their education records at Johnson & Wales University. These authorized individuals are known as an Authorized User. Utalizing jwuLink, students have the ability to select from a list of authorizations, which portions of information can be viewed by an authorized User. Information given to the Authorized User will be available in view-only format. The Authorized User will not be able to update any student information or request any written documentation via their Authorized User access. Additional Authorized User information and instructions can be found through the student's jwuLink portal. Parents are always encouraged to consult with the student if education record information is needed.

THE SPECIAL HONORS AND REWARDS PROGRAM (SHARP)

The Special Honors and Rewards Program (SHARP) is designed to allow qualifying undergraduate program students to accelerate the completion of their degree requirements in less than the normally prescribed time. This is accomplished by giving eligible students the ability to register up to 21.0 credits each semester with no additional tuition fees. SHARP offers the potential for students to save time and expenses.

To be eligible for SHARP, the student must have completed at least one semester of classes at JWU and have a cumulative GPA of 3.60 or higher.

If this criteria is met, the student's maximum allowable registration credits will reflect 21.0 for the next semester.

If this criteria is not met, the student's maximum allowable registration credits will remain at 18.0. If a student is or becomes SHARP-ineligible at the end of a semester, they may become SHARP-eligible any time in the future provided they meet the 3.60 cumulative GPA requirement at the end of a semester.

Students registered for 21.0 credits who become SHARP-ineligible for the next semester will be notified via their JWU email account. It is the student's responsibility to drop extra credits if registered, to avoid incurring additional charges.

Students who are SHARP-eligible may utilize this benefit at any time of their choosing (or not at all) and should note the following before proceeding.

- 1. Accelerating the completion of program requirements may impact future enrollment (e.g., part-time enrollment) and course sequencing).
- 2. Semester course offerings may not allow or guarantee accelerated program completion.
- 3. To plan effectively, course projections must be reviewed carefully and students should work closely with their academic counselor/advisor.

*Graduate or Evening students are not eligible for SHARP.

The following honors are issued upon graduation, based on individual GPAs:

- Cum Laude, 3.50-3.69
- Magna Cum Laude, 3.70-3.89
- Summa Cum Laude, 3.90-4.00

ADD/DROP POLICY

Add/Drop is defined as adding and dropping any number of courses but maintaining active registration in at least one other course in the semester. For courses offered on campus, students may add or drop a course by the following deadline:

- College of Food Innovation & Technology labs (that meet twice a week or consecutively):
 - Add/Drop Deadline: Thursday week 1 of the semester.
- All other courses:
 - Add/Drop Deadline: Thursday week 2 of the semester.

Add/Drop deadlines are outlined on the academic calendar.

While some classes (including culinary or baking and pastry laboratory classes) begin later than the first week of classes, the Add/Drop period at the beginning of the semester applies to all classes regardless of the start date of the lab or course. If a student does not drop a lab or course during the Add/Drop period, full tuition charges will be assessed.

For online and hybrid courses, students may add a course by the first Saturday of the course session or drop by the second Saturday of the course session. An official add or drop must be completed via jwuLink or with Student Academic Services.

Whenever students participate in add/drop, their financial aid and account charges may be adjusted. Financial aid cannot be used to pay for classes that do not count toward degree requirements (i.e., an "unused" course). In the event students remain registered for an unused course during the semester, their net tuition expense could be higher, resulting in a balance on their invoice. Students are encouraged to visit or consult Student Financial Services to review the potential impact, especially if their enrollment status changes to or from part time/full time.

When students drop a course during this time, the course is removed entirely from their schedule (there is no record of the course on the academic transcript), and if the course becomes closed it may not be added back to their schedule. Most importantly, students are strongly advised to stay on track and maintain their graduation date, especially to avoid incurring unnecessary financial debt. COURSE WITHDRAWAL

If a student drops a course after the add/drop period has ended, the process is referred to as a Course Withdrawal. Students may withdraw from a course by completing a Course Withdrawal Form with Student Academic Services or Online Student Services. A grade of "W" will be issued for each withdrawn course and recorded on the transcript as attempted credits. This grade is not calculated in the grade point average. A student who remains enrolled in one or more courses in the semester will not be eligible for a tuition credit. Students who withdraw from all courses will be withdrawn from the university and are subject to the University Withdrawal Policy.

Students must officially withdraw from a course by the course withdrawal deadline; otherwise, they will not be permitted to withdraw from the course and will be graded accordingly.

A withdrawal request after the deadline will only be permitted for extenuating conditions beyond the student's control. Students must provide documentation of the condition, which must be approved by an academic advisor/counselor. The course grade under these circumstances will be no credit (NC).

Withdrawal deadlines for academic courses and courses with an experiential education component are published on the academic calendar available on the JWU website.



ACADEMIC SUCCESS

The academic rigor and classroom expectations are different in college than they are in high school. Share these success tips with your student:

- Attend class regularly. Most learning happens in the classroom. Information covered in class lectures, discussions and activities often ends up on exams.
- **Read the entire syllabus.** Faculty provide students a syllabus (an academic contract) that outlines academic expectations and grading policies.
- **Manage time effectively.** The unstructured nature of college, combined with other distractions, makes it difficult to properly manage time. Utilizing an academic planner or calendar helps organize assignments.
- **Get to know faculty.** Introduce yourself after class or visit faculty during office hours.
- **Ask for help.** When questions arise, speak with faculty early and schedule tutoring appointments at the Academic Success Center as needed.

STUDENT ACADEMIC SERVICES

Student Academic Services (SAS) ensures the accuracy, integrity, and security of academic records in compliance with institutional policies, state, and federal laws. It also advises students on achieving their educational goals, transitioning to new academic and social communities, developing sound academic and career goals, and becoming successful learners. The team members in SAS provide a variety of services that support our students, faculty and staff. Our core functions are:

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Information Technology (IT) provides technology tools, services and support to the university community. Services offered include help with Wildcat email, software and hardware discounts, computer labs, complimentary printing, internet and Wi-Fi, gaming and mobile apps. ACADEMIC SUCCESS CENTER

The Academic Success Center (ASC) provides educational resources for all students. ASC offers tutoring services, academic success coaching and writing assistance. In addition to face-to-face tutoring services, the center also offers Tutor.com, an online tutorial service available through jwuLink 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The Academic Success Center also includes Accessibility Services. Accessibility Services ensures equal access for students with disabilities to empower them to achieve academic success. Students who wish to request accommodation(s) based on a disability should schedule an appointment with the Assistant Director of Accessibility Services to discuss any disability- related barriers the student anticipates or experiences.

Students are not required to disclose their disabilities. Disclosure is always voluntary; however, to receive any accommodations, the student must self-disclose the disability to Accessibility Services and provide current documentation of the disability and demonstrate functional limitations using the application for accommodations, found at the website listed below. Please note that family members may not request academic accommodations or other support services for their student's accommodations unless shared by their students. LIBRARY

The JWU Library offers resources and services designed to meet the scholastic needs of our students. The Library is open six days a week during the academic year, with ample seating and study space conducive to individual or group study. Macs and PCs, printers, scanners and Wi-Fi are readily available, as are book, video and journal collections of over 100,000 items. More than 80 research databases are accessible on and off campus, providing a rich array of e-books, e-journals, reports, streaming videos, museum images and more. Friendly librarians provide research instruction, advice and support both online and in person. The library also hosts a variety of monthly programs which are open to the campus community. BOOKSTORE

The campus bookstore located on Trade Street provides the flexibility and convenience students need to begin each term. The bookstore offers affordable textbook solutions such as used books, book rentals, prices matching and digital resources. TIME MANAGEMENT & PROCRASTINATION

College offers more flexibility than high school, with less in-class time and a greater focus on independent coursework. This newfound freedom can create challenges for students to effectively manage their schedules. Here are some tips to help students stay on track and avoid procrastination:

- Use a timesheet or schedule to map out common activities (class, work, sleep, hobbies, homework, etc.) and visually identify your free time.
- Use a daily, weekly and monthly calendar to keep on track with assignment deadlines and test preparation.
- Attend a meeting with an Academic Success Coach to focus on time-management skills, study strategies, etc.

EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION & CAREER SERVICES

Experiential Education & Career Services (EE&CS) supports the university's missions to integrate general education, professional skills, and career services to students by providing them with customized services and support to empower students to make effective career choices, identify and pursue internships, secure employment and navigate their career.

EE&CS assists students through career advising and workshops, resume critiques, mock interviews, internship advising, career fairs and on-campus interviews. All students, including first-year students, can visit EE&CS for help creating or updating their resume to search for part-time work on or off campus, as well as assistance accessing our online platform - Handshake specifically for JWU students, which includes jobs, internships and event details. Students can visit jwuLink for the latest updates and resources.

FINANCIAL RESOURCES

STUDENT FINANCIAL SERVICES

JWU offers several types of financial assistance (including scholarships, grants, low-interest loans and federal work-study) to assist students with meeting their educational expenses. In many cases, qualified students receive a financial aid package which may include a combination of these awards. JWU financial planners can assist students with the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students who wish to continue to receive financial aid must re-apply every year, as early as December 1. Financial planners also advise students on options to pay for educational expenses after financial aid (including payment plans) and loan options.


Students can view invoices, financial aid awards and holds via their jwuLink account. All students must clear financial requirements every semester and meet their financial obligations by the posted due date in order to maintain a preferred course schedule. Families can gain access to their student's account once they become an Authorized User. Students can choose to permit a parent or guardian as an Authorized User, and can select the information they want that user to have ability to access.

iGRAD

JWU can help you navigate the financial maze of student loans and borrowing. Student Financial Services partners with iGRAD, our online financial literacy tool, to assist you and your student with financial decisions. Through videos, articles and games, you and your student will gain the skills and knowledge to make good credit decisions critical to financial success.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Student Employment offers students the opportunity to gain meaningful, professionally-focused work experience while earning money. Working at JWU also provides opportunities for skill development, exposure to work environment, and the convenience and flexibility of on-campus job locations. Students awarded federal work-study can work in various, flexible, part-time jobs on or off campus in community service jobs. If your student did not receive a work-study award, there are other employment opportunities available.







RESIDENTIAL LIFE

Living on campus gives students an opportunity to experience the best of JWU. Our three residence halls offer suite-style and apartment-style living. All first, second and third year students are required to live on campus (with some exceptions). All rooms feature an extra-long twin bed, desk, chair, dresser and closet space. Students should visit jwuLink for a list of recommended items to bring.

RESDENCE HALL ADDRESS

SHARING A ROOM

- Speak with the Resident Director or Resident Assistant.

RESIDENTIAL MEAL PLANS

Residential students select from a range of Wildcat Meal plans (14,18 or All Access) All meal plans also include flex dollars which can be used for Vending services located through out campus. The meal plan cost is applied to the student's account. Meal plans are selected for the academic year during the room selection process.

- Meal swipes are assigned weekly and expire on Saturday night and reset on Sunday morning.
- Out of swipes? Use flex dollars or credit/ debit cards at venues.
- Out of flex dollars? Quick easy purchase from our app or website.

COMMUTER MEAL BLOCKS

Meal blocks are a convenient way to ensure your student does not have to worry about where their next meal is coming from. We offer blocks to meet students' needs at a fraction of the cost of eating out and even cheaper than cooking for themselves. With no waste, no need to plan menus, no worries about roommates taking their food, and no cleaning up, it's a hassle-free option. Their entire focus can be on school and the many activities that come along with the college experience. Meal blocks carry over from week to week and term to term and do not reset until the end of the academic year. Block swipes are there to use whenever and however a student wants. PARKING & TRANSPORTATION

Lot D: Parking Garage

This lot serves all students, employees and visitors. This is the Cedar Street Parking Deck located adjacent to the Academic Center and across the street from Cedar Hall North.

Lot B: Gravel Lot

This lot serves commuter students only. Overnight parking is prohibited.

Charlotte's public transportation managed by the Charlotte Area Transit System (CATS), offers convenient options for getting around the city. The bus system features over 70 routes, including express services, with real-time tracking available via the CATS-Pass App. The LYNX Blue Line, a 19.3-mile light rail, connects University City to I-485, passing through Uptown Charlotte. The CityLYNX Gold Line streetcar links key neighborhoods and destinations like Johnson & Wales University Charlotte and Novant Health Medical Center to Uptown. Whether you are commuting, exploring or catching a flight, Charlotte's transit options help you get there with ease and style!

CAMPUS SAFETY & SECURITY

Campus Safety & Security (CSS) fosters a safe and inclusive environment by building community knowledge, awareness, and preparedness. Officers patrol campus property, investigate incidents, maintain emergency preparedness plans, and alert the campus community of threats and crimes. To enhance safety, JWU community members access campus buildings through JWU IDs, ensuring only authorized individuals can enter. CSS manages Blue Light emergency phones, which allow students to contact the office if they feel threatened or unsafe, and oversees a multi-contact message system that delivers critical emergency instructions to the entire JWU community. Emergency alerts are also posted on jwuLink. The office hosts crime prevention programs, manages the Silent Witness Program, and provides safe walk escorts upon request, fostering a secure and supportive campus environment. Campus Safety & Security is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

LOST & FOUND

Items are held for 90 days. Call 980-598-1900 about lost items at any time, day or night; however, items can only be picked up Mon-Fri 8am-4pm.

PROJECT ID

To aid in the recovery of lost or stolen items, valuables are engraved with a unique number, which is then entered into a database with your information.

SAFE WALK

COMMUNICATION

Communications officers answer emergency, non-emergency and business telephone lines at all times. They radio-dispatch security officers to calls for service and monitor alarms for campus buildings.

HOW YOU CAN HELP YOUR STUDENT:

HEALTH & WELLNESS

COUNSELING SERVICES

Counseling services, a confidential resource for students, provides support to help manage emotional wellbeing. Services include short-term individual therapy, group therapy, crisis intervention, consultation and outreach programs, and referrals. Participation in counseling is voluntary and students can make appointments by calling the center. If your student needs long-term or specialized services, counselors will provide local referral information. For emergencies after 4:30 p.m. and on weekends, students can call 1-888-222-4805.

HEALTH SERVICES

Health Services provides comprehensive healthcare to students on the Charlotte Campus. Trained medical professionals, including a team of licensed nurses and nurse practitioners, assess and treat students with acute illnesses and injuries. Health Services verify medical records as required by the NC for admissions. Health Services also offer care coordination for urgent and emergency referrals off campus as indicated Students are provided assistance with scheduling specialist appointments and follow up care. Prescriptions are sent electronically to local pharmacies.

Sexual education, contraception management, and STI testing are also available. Free HIV, STI testing, and treatment is provided monthly in partnership with Mecklenburg Health Department. All care provided is confidential. Atrium or Novant Health Urgent Care, hospitals, the local health department, or CVS Minute Clinic are utilized when students need off-campus medical services after hours. For urgent matters after hours or emergencies, please call 911 and campus safety and security.

Maintaining a healthy mind, body and spirit in college is essential to academic and personal success. Health Services assists students in reaching these goals through opportunities such as collaborative on-campus programming, preventative education, and education provided during each visit. Campus Outreach and programs include substance abuse education, smoking cessation, sexual health, disordered eating, hypertension, community CPR, and lifestyle medicine. Additional workshops and training are provided based on requests.
